
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

You will learn all about the **Visual Elements** when studying Art and Design. The **Visual Elements** are the building blocks that artists use to create a work of art!

There are 7 Visual Elements: Line, Colour, Tone, Texture, Pattern, Shape and Form.

In this worksheet we will look at 3 Visual Elements.

Colour

Colour is very important when creating an artwork. It can be used to create light, show emotion and to make your artwork eye catching. Can you think of some other reasons that colour is important when creating artwork?

Below you can see the colour wheel. You will be able to see how the colour wheel is split into primary and secondary colours. You will also be able to see that there are warm colours, cold colours and contrasting colours.

Use the colour wheel to help you create an eye-catching sky above Springburn Academy. To draw your sky you must use either:

- Cold colours
- Warm colours

· Complementary colours
